A reminder - next month's meeting will be at the Capital Mineral Club's show at Sunapee State Park in Newbury, New Hampshire, on Saturday, August 21.



A note of Thanks

Many thanks to Pat Barker, who arranged purchase of Quintin Wight's book, "The Complete Book of Micromounting." Pat's order arrived one day before the meeting - just in time to have the author autograph copies of all books ordered. Most are very impressed with the book as it appears to be truly complete. There is a description of our Northeast Meeting, and the names of at least eleven MMNE members appear in it, along with many other familiar names of micromounters.

On the subject of Quebec, Steve and Janet investigated two familiar localities following the Mont Saint-Hilaire weekend. At Asbestos, the road leading into the area where they have previously dumped material for collectors is now posted, and it appears that no material has been added for some time. At the antimony mine at Ham Sud, a small amount of color is visible at the bottom of a narrow crevice, where the work required to obtain it would probably not be worth it.

We regret to report the death of Arthur Roe of Tucson, a member of the Micromounters Hall of Fame. An amateur collector, he volunteered his time after his retirement to curate the micromount collection at the University of Arizona, and he helped to set up a similar collection at the Arizona Sonora Desert Museum, located outside of Tucson.

Response to an article in our bulletin:

I read in the February issue of the MMNE the very good article on using a database on a computer. Mr. Glenn creates a fine set of examples very similar to the database I have currently running on Paradox (Ed. note: a relational database software package). I would like to add to his database at least two other fields that I have found useful. I have included them in the "specimen" area, and they are a one position field (that is, a one-character field) that I label as "Want" for those items that I read about in various magazines and would like to add to my collection. I tried to use a list created by hand on a pad or card stock, but only succeeded in misplacing it and rendering the whole project useless. I am more apt to fire up the 386 [computer] and add to the database. It is a fine easy step. The other field I have is for a size of the specimen - mm for micro, tn for thumbnail, ha for hand, etc. It uses two positions (characters within a field), and is handy.

It might be of use to those not having a computer, to follow this style for their records. It is as easy to have three card files with this info, and it can be quite workable and easy to setup and maintain.

Another value of using a computer is the ability to use a word processor or even Lotus or one of the other spread sheet software packages to create your labels. Reduction in type size is easy, and I use a product called GEOS Pro to create the labels for my micromount boxes. Even better, these can be printed directly on label stock and just cut out and attached
