Changes in Saint-Hilaire dates:



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FROM THE PRESIDENT Glenn R. Bolick

READ ALL ABOUT IT in our respective club bulletins. In exchange bulletins and in the Federation DIGEST and NEWSLETTER - but before we can read it, it has to be

written; and we must keep in mind that bulletins were never intended to be more or less one-man productions.

A journalist friend once told me that all the stories that he would ever write had been written during the first two years

written during the first two years of his career. The dates, the places and the names would be different, but it would be the same stories so with pen in hand, with new dates, new places and new names, let's create our versions of the "same old stories".



One doesn't have to earn a degree in Journalism to be able to report on a club event or write an article about some mineral or fossil. Most, if not all, editors will gladly "polish up" a rough draft, provided it is in hand before the "eleventh hour".

1992 GEOLOGY TOUR The 1992 EFMLS Geology Tour will begin about 5:00 P.M. on Saturday, June 20th and end at noon on Friday, July 3rd. This should allow travel time for those persons who wish to attend both the geology tour

and the Wildacres Workshop. We will start the tour in the area of Natural Bridge, New York, visiting several days under the guidance of Dr. Steven Chamberlain. We will then travel to Vermont for a short stay, and spend the second week in New Hampshire where Bob Whitmore will be our guide for a time.

This is designed to be primarily a camping tour. One note - there will be collecting areas that we visit which will require a walk in to reach them.

The fee for the tour is \$85.00 per person. Children under 12 free, ages 12-18 are \$40.00. The tour will be limited to the first fifty (50) people who apply.

Several inquiries have been received for the ASSIST, but no applications to date. I thoroughly believe that out there are 15-25 year old hobbyists who could use some

The Assist will be presented at the Eastern Federation Convention in September.

The following qualifications are needed to be considered for the Wilma D. Bonar Educational Assist:

- 1. Age 15-25 at time of application.
- 2. Not related to the Henry Bonar family nor to any current EFMLS officer at time of application.



- 3. Committed to continuing higher education in the Earth Sciences including high school as well as college.
- 4. Active member in good standing of at least one local club affiliated with the EFMLS.
- 5. An applicant, preceding application, should have exhibited locally and possibly in one other show at least. Documentation for the satisfaction of this requirement should include dates, name of places, description of entry, and distinctions received, if any.
- 6. Because of distances involved, it is not mandatory to visit other clubs. However, when possible, every effort should be exercised to do so. Names of clubs visited, dates attended, and names of president or secretary should be specified for verification.
- 7. The applicants personal resume should include complete description of efforts and activities to promote the earth science hobby including, but not limited to lectures to student groups, displays of own "earth science treasures" to interested groups, etc. These personal efforts will be an important aspect in considering a student's application, including also, how many young people the applicant had influenced to become active in the hobby.

10 years? 20 years? 30 years? How long was it before you realized that not all "rocks" are just rocks? for me, it took over 40!

A letter of invitation to schools, scout troops, 4-H and church youth groups

to attend and exhibit in our club shows; meeting and field trip announcements through the local newspaper and radio station; a personal phone call - these are all means of telling the young folks out there that we have something for them as well as adults.

Going beyond our respective geographical areas, let us let our EFMLS Junior Activities Chairman, Mabel Kingdon-Gross, 14 Jones St; Madison,ME 04950, (207) 696-5355, know what we are doing to attract and arouse interest and curiosity in young minds about our wonderful hobby so that she can pass it along.

As to getting new ideas from sister clubs, we can also make a quick check through the Federation "Directory" to see which ones have a sizeable junior membership. (They must be doing something right!) Reports on junior activities can be gleaned from exchange bulletins.

No matter what channels we go through, COMMUNICA-TION is the first step toward getting our youth involved.

From junior high through high school to college with a career in some area of Earth Science in mind - to a summer job with a major oil company - to graduation with a BS in geology - to a permanent job with the oil company and building a mineral exhibit that would earn a Federation Junior Trophy along the way: one young man's ACCOMPLISHMENTS which stemmed from a simple beginning. The junior high science teacher had taken his promising student along to the mineral club meetings.

One doesn't have to hold a degree in order to go into the classroom to talk about minerals or fossils. I haven't heard of a volunteer being turned away yet.

PARTICIPATION need not be kept within the confines of four walls. It is a joy to watch a youngsters eyes "light up" at the first glimpse of a partially unearthed crystal or the inside of a geode. A card decorated with tiny crystal or shell "flowers" on a child's hospital tray; a little bag of specimens, with festive tie, for foster children at Christmastime or birthday; minerals or fossils as party favors or a student's reward for some special achievement can be equally enlightening.

...so let's give our young folks the 10, 20, 30 or 40 extra years of enjoyment that many of us missed.

LEGISLATIVE ARM FORMED BY AFMS

The officers and Directors of the American Federation, meeting in convention July 22, 1992, authorized the formation of a legislative action organization. As a result of this Boa. authorization, the American Lands

Access Association has been organized.

The A.L.A.A. is registered in the state of Idaho as a non-profit corporation under the IRS Code 501(c)(4) which permits direct political and legislative activities by a non-profit organization

The A.L.A.A. has adopted the following statement of purpose: "To promote and ensure the right of amateur collecting and recreational mining, and the use of public and private lands for educational and recreational purposes." The established goal of the A.L.A.A. is to maintain and ensure access to existing or potential collecting sites.

A Board of Directors representing all areas of the U.S. was elected at the organizational meeting. Jon Spunaugle was selected as President. R. Ed-Romack was selected as Treasurer.

Funding of the A.L.A.A. is through individual annual membership fees and grants and contributions which may be received. No AFMS funds may be used for this organization.

Rockhounds living in our western states and those of us who love to cut material found in our western states (or collect minerals from these areas) need to be alert to the ever shrinking access we have to these valuable areas. Legislation is pending annually which encroaches on our rights to pursue or hobby and so this organization, the A.L.A.A. is of extreme importance to each of us in the hobby.
